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## POPE AND HOLY SEE

### Pope Encourages Young People to Keep a Spiritual Journal

- Message for the 2017 World Youth Day

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**Pope Francis** encouraged young people to keep a “spiritual journal every day and to “cultivate praise.” In his Message for the 2017 World Youth Day, published on March 21, the Pontiff invites them to “remain connected” to God. The Church is not a “flashmob,” and life must not be a “reality show,” he also stressed.

“I have (. . .) at heart that you young people can walk not only by remembering the past, but by having (. . .) courage in the present and hope for the future,” writes the Holy Father in his long Message for the WYD that will be observed at the diocesan level on Palm Sunday, April 9, on the theme “For He who is mighty has done great things for me” (Luke 1:49).

To be young does not mean, in fact, “to be disconnected from the past,” he explains. The facts of the past must be “a dynamic reality, on which to reflect and to draw a teaching and meaning for our present and our future,” he continues. It is about “discovering the red thread of the love of God that connects our whole existence.”

To do so, he offers suggestions to “remain connected”: “At the end of each day we can pause for a few minutes to recall the good moments, the challenges, what went well and what went wrong. Thus, before God and ourselves, we can express sentiments of gratitude, of repentance and of trust by writing them, if you wish, in a notebook, a sort of spiritual journal.”

The Pope recommends to “know the Bible well, the Word of God, to read it each day and compare it with your life.” He also invites to “cultivate praise, to not be fixed solely on problems and difficulties.

### Decide Your Future!

To those who are “particularly wounded by life’s circumstance, who would like to ‘reconfigure’ their life, the Pope says: “there are no Saints without a past, or sinners without a future. A pearl is born in the wound of an oyster!”

However, to have a past “is not the same thing as to have a history,” says Pope Francis, putting one on guard against the excesses of the social networks: “Young people’s faces (. . .) appear in numerous photographs that speak of more or less real events, but we do not know in all of that what is a ‘history,’ an experience that can be told, having an objective and a meaning.

“Do not let yourselves be misled by this false image of reality!” he insists. “Be protagonists of your history, decide your future!” And the Pontiff assures: “You young people can also do great things, take on great responsibilities, if you recognize the merciful and all powerful action of God in your life.”

“Your history also has its place in the history of the Church,” continues the Pope, stressing that “a genuine experience of the Church is not like a flashmob, where one gets together, does a performance and then each one goes his own way. The Church bears in herself a long Tradition, which is transmitted from generation to generation, being enriched at the same time by each one’s experience.”

### A “Reality Show” Life

“A society that only values the present also tends to devalue all that is of the past, as for instance the institutions of marriage, of consecrated life, of the priestly mission,” adds the Pontiff in his Message: “These end by being seen as bereft of meaning, as exceeded models.”

Pope Francis exhorts young people to not let themselves “be deceived!” “One thinks that one lives better in so-called ‘open’ situations, behaving in life as in a reality show, without an objective and without an end.” However, “to accord the value due to the past” helps to “plan a future of happiness.”

“Our time does not need ‘couch potato young people,’” said the Pope, taking up the expression used in the 2016 Krakow WYD. He gives Mary as a model, who “is not the sort of person that, to be at ease, is in need of



## Perpetual Adoration

Finally, the Holy Father mentions the October 2018 Synod, on the theme: “Young People, Faith and Discernment of Vocations.”

“We will ask ourselves about the way that you, young people, live the experience of faith in the midst of the challenges of our time. And we will also address the question of the way in which you can mature a life project, by discerning your vocation, understood in the wide sense, namely, to marriage, in the secular and professional environment, or in consecrated life and the priesthood.”

## A God Who Makes Us Think

The Gospel for Monday, April 3 is about the adulterous woman who was about to be stoned. The scribes and Pharisees wanted to test Jesus' adherence to the law, and asked Him directly, "**Teacher... So what do you say?**" (Jn 8:4,5) What they did not know was that they were in for one of the most powerful teachings to come from Jesus.

To me, one of the strongest proofs of Jesus' divinity comes, not from the miracles He performed, but from the instances when there was no miracle, and yet the lesson that was affirmed is so powerful that it can only point to Divine Love. The episode involving this woman is one of them.

In this world, there is actually a place for laws and rules. While useful, man does have a tendency to limit life to simple adherence to them, because, in a very real sense, it's easier since it's the laws that will rule, and conveniently, man wouldn't really have to think for himself: Compliance = Salvation.

To the modern person, the law of Moses would seem barbaric – *death as the punishment for adultery?* If we dismiss this whole episode as archaic because of that, then I suspect that we would miss out on a number of precious lessons to come out of it.

First, as aforementioned, how Jesus did not need a miracle to save a woman's life. Furthermore, how He was able to use the occasion to show the men who wanted to stone her, the folly of strict adherence to the law, but more importantly, the folly of self-righteousness when in reality, all were sinners in need of forgiveness. And in the end, how Jesus Himself did not condemn – He simply said, "**Go, and from now on do not sin any more.**" (Jn 8:11)

Much like the Parable of the Prodigal Son (where no miracle was involved either), the episode seems to have been placed in the Gospel by the Evangelist so that Christ can make us think, way beyond simple adherence to rules and laws.

We don't have to look far to see a "what have you done for me lately" perspective; in the Old Testament reading for the next day (Tuesday, April 4). Despite having seen an actual miracle with the parting of the Red Sea, the children of Israel were still complaining. Seems that for some people, even big miracles like that had an expiration clause attached to their belief.

The understatement is that Jesus is different. Even His summary of the two greatest commandments – love God and love neighbor – leaves so much for us to ponder and act upon. In the end, love should rule, and He makes us think about how it will in our lives.

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even the natural law involving the loss of life. With faith as small as a mustard seed, the Lord tells us that we can do marvelous things, things that may seem humanly impossible. How much less demanding it would be for us to let go of our old ways, abandon bad habits, get rid of our old self-centered ways, and make ourselves available for the cross.

It is possible that, with no meaningful relationship with God, our life may have lost purpose and direction. We may be slaves to sin, shackled to addiction, obsessions and fatal attractions. We may be among the living dead who live in tombs, not tombs of stone, but tombs of the spirit, mind and heart, and from these Jesus calls us to come forth. When Jesus says,

He is teaching us that the critical moment in every human life is not the moment of a job promotion, or marriage, or of giving birth. Not even the moment of death, but the moment when we turn from unbelief to authentic belief in Jesus. The moment is decisive because it connects us to Jesus in a very personal way.

One of the keys to our spiritual growth as Christians is believing in God's love – even when we cannot see it. Jesus then becomes not a distant figure but someone close to us and involved in our life. From Him, we receive a new kind of life that is stronger than death because it is Jesus' own life that we call "grace."

The miracle of Lazarus coming to life is the promise of new spiritual life that Jesus can give to us here and now. Jesus gives us this new life that conquers any kind of death. The point of this Lazarus Gospel is that Jesus is indeed the Resurrection and the Life, as embodied in our promise this 5th Sunday of Lent - "**I will put my spirit in you that you may come to life.**" (Ez 37:14a)

### Directions:

1. Share God's presence with those seeking fulfillment in life, serving and praying for all who live their new life in the Spirit.
2. Be a living witness of the Gospel.
