BLD Singles Prays Twice in Elizabeth



Unbeknownst to many in BLD, for over a year now, the Praise group of the Singles Ministry has been supporting the parish community of St. Genevieve's in Elizabeth, NJ. On the first Sunday of each month, they have been providing the music for the Church's 7 pm Mass. Last Saturday evening, **Prays Twice**, as they are known by the churchgoers of St. Gen's did something extra special. They put together a simple yet powerful event – "A Night of Praise and Worship."

For regular attendees of BLD, it wouldn't have appeared like it was anything fancy - there was Adoration, Invocation; Readings and Reflections; Contrition and Supplications; Thanksgiving and Praise. There was also the special and unique brand of music that Singles Praise plays in Rahway every Friday. But what made it look easy was much effort and careful planning by the Praise Pillars of the Singles Ministry. Added to that simple formula was the presence of the Holy Spirit, Who multiplied everyone's offerings, transforming two-hours on Saturday evening into a truly memorable night for the more than a hundred parishioners who had attended.

COUNSELS

LOVE AND FORGIVENESS

THEME: The spoken word of God empowers us to share the fruits of forgiveness.

share the fruits of forgiveness.

WORD: 2 Sm 12:7-10,13 ~ Ps 32:1-2,5,7,11

Gal 2:16,19-21 ~ Lk 7:36 - 8:3

ORDER: 1. Go in peace, your sins are forgiven.

2. Be glad in the Lord and rejoice.

REFLECTION:

All four Gospel accounts include the narrative of the penitent woman. Simon a Pharisee, invited Jesus to dinner but did not render the traditional hospitality. The woman, who came uninvited, washed Jesus' feet with her tears, dried them with her hair, kissed them and anointed them with expensive perfumed oil. Simon and his guests were scandalized that Jesus Who was a known prophet, would allow a sinful woman to attend to Him. Reading their minds, He asked Simon about two debtors whose debts were cancelled. "One owed five hundred days' wages, and the other fifty. Which of them will love him more?" (Lk 7:41,42) Simon replied: "The one, I suppose, whose larger debt was forgiven." (Lk 7:43) Jesus agreed and reminded him that he had not offered Him hospitality, while the woman had not stopped ministering to Him. Then Jesus told the woman: "Your faith has saved you; go in peace." (Lk 7:50) Faith in Jesus drew her to seek forgiveness. God's grace leads us to repentance. When we repent, He forgives us and His forgiveness brings about healing and transformation.

The letter to the Galatians relates how the Jewish converts to Christianity who were still following the Mosaic law, believed that the Gentile converts should first be subjected to Mosaic law, in order for them to be accepted as Christians and thus obtain salvation.

Promise of the Week

"For his part, the LORD has removed your sin.
You shall not die." (2 Sm 12:13)

RECOMPENSE FROM GOD

"Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." (Mt 5:44) Jesus is teaching us the way we should relate to people, in particular, those with whom we have some conflict with and those we find difficult to love.

How could we love those who cause us harm or ill-will? To love an enemy is contrary to human nature and goes against our worldly way. It is human to get even with an enemy, but it is Christian to forgive; for we are all children of God Who loves both the good and the bad. We can make a decision to love even though we have no feeling of love for a person, for love is not a feeling but an act of the will. "For if you love those who love you, what recompense will you have?" (Mt 5:46)

As Christians, we must continually be reminded of how Jesus lived what He said in Matthew 5:43-48. He came as the One sinless human in a sinful world where people had turned to their own ways, weak and ungodly. Yet, Jesus loved them and died for them (Rom 5:6-11). He prayed for Jerusalem, knowing He would be killed there (Mt 23:37-39). He prayed for those who executed Him while they were in the very act of killing Him (Lk 23:34). God loves us despite our unworthiness; we must love others despite their unworthiness. What excuse do we have to do otherwise?

When Jesus asks us to be perfect as the heavenly Father is perfect (Mt 5:48), He is talking about the perfection of love, particularly through love for enemies. This sounds like a fantasy! Yet, it is better to strive for this ideal and fall short than never to have tried at all.

Only God can help us to love as He loves and in the way Christ asks of us. God gives power and grace to those who believe and accept the gift of the Holy Spirit, with a holy desire to please God in all things. We must practice true piety, a loving devotion to God. Almsgiving, praying and fasting are seen as the key signs of a pious person. However, Jesus warns us in Matthew 6:1-6 about the self-seeking desire of the hypocrites who perform righteous deeds only to draw recognition and praise from others. They have received their reward. The implicit promise of recompense from our heavenly Father is directed to those who seek the divine way.

Lord, grant me the grace to seek You with a humble and repentant heart. Renew me each day with a heart of love and compassion that I may grow in love for You and for my neighbor. A sure reward of being in communion with You is all I hope for.

BEYOND FIRST IMPULSE

"An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth. But I say to you, offer no resistance to one who is evil. When someone strikes you on [your] right cheek, turn the other one to him as well. If anyone wants to go to law with you over your tunic, hand him your cloak as well. Should anyone press you for service for one mile, go with him for two miles. Give to the one who asks of you, and do not turn your back on one who wants to borrow." (Mt 5:38-42)

We find ourselves in many situations that cause us to react instinctively or impulsively to events that impact our well-being (physically, psychologically, economically or spiritually). Depending on the severity of the perceived impact, response times may vary, from an instantaneous reflex action, to well-thought out retaliatory responses. All of our responses are influenced by our physiological and psychological make up which are continuously being shaped by the evolving environment that we live in.

Our first impulse to any event is often an instinctive reaction, a natural and automatic reflex which takes place without any conscious or logical evaluation on our part. These non-cerebral reactions are similar to a computer's instructions that provide programmed responses to situations that are downloaded into it. Alas, we cannot use the computer instruction theory to justify our rash responses that may worsen rather than resolve an issue. The teaching of our Lord Jesus Christ regarding retaliation prohibits exacting revenge, even though proportionate reaction was espoused by the Old Testament commandment in Leviticus (Lv 24:20). Jesus' teaching on retaliation is also an extension of His new commandment to love one another (Jn 13:34).

Take some time to ponder the Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde persona that many of us morph into whenever we get into our cars. Many of us, unconsciously become road warriors, Formula 1 racers, and even kings of the road. Often we bring out our vocabulary of expletive words and a variety of offensive gestures to express our disapproval of perceived infringements of our rights. Some end up with uncontrolled road rage that can have lethal or disastrous results for all parties involved. This example describes the instantaneous shift, from our normal selves to primitive beings, that can happen when guided by instinct and impulses that tend to worsen, rather than resolve, situations.



Paul believed that the way to salvation was through faith in Christ, rather than the law. He was prompted to journey to Jerusalem to seek counsel from the apostles and presbyters. Peter, after much debate, declared that there was no need to subject the Gentiles to the Mosaic law. What everyone needed for salvation was faith in Jesus Christ and repentance of sins.

In the first book of Samuel 16:7, we see God counseling Samuel not to judge by outer appearance but to look at the heart. He then commanded Samuel to anoint David king of Israel. David is the only one in the scriptures to whom God said: "a man after his own heart." (1 Sm 13:14) He earned this distinction not because of his righteousness but due to his total dependence on God. When confronted with his sins, he owned up to them, repented, and accepted the punishment for his sins.

God forgave David, and He forgave the woman in the Gospel reading. Through His words, God shows us that it is not the enormity of our sins that He focuses on but the sincerity of our hearts. A sincere repentance gains us God's peace and forgiveness.

God, our heavenly Father, we praise You and bless Your holy name. Thank You for sending Your Son Jesus to redeem us from our sins and grant us eternal life. Thank You for Your Holy Spirit Who transforms us into the image of Christ. You are truly loving and forgiving, slow to anger and rich in kindness.

In essence, we must learn to rein in reflexive actions, and pattern our responses, upon the love taught to us by our Lord Jesus Christ, in all the circumstances that we may face.
