## Thousands get much needed medical and dental attention at this year's Medical Mission

Once again, BLD Newark successfully sponsored a week-long Medical Mission to the Philippines (February 11-14, 2019). This year, it was held in the town of Jose Panganiban, Camarines Norte, in the Bicol region of the Philippines.

According to one of the volunteer doctors who served, this year's Mission was held in probably one of the most remote sites that she had ever been to as part of the BLD Newark Community's noble annual effort of providing free care to the poor in the Philippines. For many from the region, because of the scarcity of services in and around the area, BLD's Mission provided them a rare opportunity to see a health care professional for much needed medical and dental care. There were about 8,500 beneficiaries during the four days of the Mission, among whom were many children suffering from life-long ailments.

As much as many were helped over there, it was the gratitude for the full hearts that the medical missionaries from over here received as they served, that probably delivered the most joy.

Thank you to all the volunteers and the members of the Mission team. The months of planning and preparation really paid off! May God bless our BLD Newark volunteers and our Community, and the people of Jose Panganiban!

## About Judging Others

THEME: We respond to God's unconditional love when our hearts are filled with righteousness.

WORD: Sir 27:4-7 ~ Ps 92:2-3,13-14,15-16  
1 Cor 15:54-58 ~ Lk 6:39-45

ORDER: ***"Be firm, steadfast, always fully devoted to the work of the Lord."*** (1Cor 15:58b)

REFLECTION:

***Our*** love for God becomes clear when, in our baptism, the Holy Spirit fills our hearts with righteousness. We have been justified by Christ's death and resurrection, bringing us out of darkness into the light of righteousness. Our actions should speak of goodness, not evil; for if there is goodness in our hearts, good is produced; but if there is evil in our hearts, evil is produced (cf. Lk 6:45a).

When we relate to others through words and action, it is essential to show love, care and understanding. Sometimes, we are so self-engrossed that we are not careful about how we look at others. We might see that we are already self-sufficient, especially when compared to them, and so, only notice their defects, but not our own imperfections. We are quick to see what is wrong with others, but disregard or fail to notice what is wrong with ourselves. And when people point out our faults, we might feel insulted and nurture resentment. Sometimes though, there are moments when we swallow our pride and accept being corrected. It's during those times that we realize that we've become better at criticizing others, but have been blind to our own shortcomings.

causes us to see the flaws of others, and not the good or the potential in them, while rendering us blind to our own faults and failures. Jesus admonished persons



like these as hypocrites, **"Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own?"** (Lk 6:41) There are many examples of that wooden beam. We readily criticize the messiness in a

neighbor's surroundings, but do not see the garbage piling up in our own houses. Sometimes, we preach moral teachings to others, but forget that our own family needs pastoring. We might be quick to judge our leaders for what we perceive as burdensome directives, and so, refuse to cooperate. Often it's easier to complain, but when we just criticize and do not act, we fail to do our small part to improve things. There is this saying that we should observe - if you have nothing good to say to a person, then it is better to stay silent.

As Christ's followers, we are called to be a light to others, to point out the truth to them. As Christians, our speech and actions must be edifying to others, and not used to bring them down. Our own testimony must be true and not a pretense, **"for from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks."**



(Lk 6:45b) Then others will see the righteousness of Christ in us. Let not our mouths, with which we offer praise to God, be used to curse or judge others. Let not our hands that we raise to honor God be used to hurt others.

Jesus has clothed us with His righteousness. Let us continue to examine ourselves, allowing others to give us feedback so that we might recognize our defects, and learn to be mindful of them. The light of Christ shines when we come out of the darkness of our pretenses; when we walk in righteousness and treat each other with kindness, we can claim the fruitful promise of the Lord:

**They shall bear fruit even in old age; vigorous and sturdy shall they be.** (cf. Ps 92:15)
