With God present in John 6 Crossing # 19, NOTHING IS IMPOSSIBLE!



This past Sunday's reading from Mark's Gospel was most fitting for the John 6 Ministry's Weekend Crossing #19, which was held at the Sacred Heart Retreat Center in Newton, NJ. Twenty-two children, ages 10-14, came to learn more about God's love and His presence in theirs and everyone's lives. Some candidates were Mark 10 children who were ready to move on to John 6; others were children of new Solo Parents and Marriage Encounter members; and some were children of parishioners of St. Antoninus Church. Among the candidates were a few kids who were siblings, and some who were cousins or were friends who already knew each other from their own Churches. So, as the weekend started, many of the children were already familiar with each other. There was little apprehension among them and they were soon very energetic, enthusiastic and comfortable at the retreat. As they dropped their kids off, it seemed that the goodbyes affected the parents more than their children, even though for most of the kids, it was their first time to sleep away from home.

One of the class shepherds summed up the weekend: "This weekend was great! It was amazing to watch the candidates grow and learn more about God. I could see the difference from the beginning of Saturday to the end of Sunday; how they became more attentive and began to listen more to the teachings and the sharings."

Share Your Blessings

THEME: We inherit the Kingdom of God when we share our blessings with those in need.

WORD: Wis 7:7-11 ~ Ps 90:12-13,14-15,16-17

Heb 4:12-13 ~ Mk 10:17-30

ORDER: "...come follow me." - Mk 10:21b

REFLECTION:

Young man as he hurries towards Jesus and falls on his knees before Him. This is the action of a man, not only filled with personal certainty and determined desire for something, but one who has great respect for Jesus. He is quite different from the Pharisees and Sadducees who hound Jesus only to trap Him. This young man seemed honest and worthy, only wanting to ask about how he could gain eternal life. Just as it was for him, it is a question which has occupied our minds and that of all true Christians throughout the ages.

The rich young man addresses Jesus, "Good teacher." Then almost to set the youth straight and maybe, curb his enthusiasm, Jesus answers,

"Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone" (Mk 10:18). Jesus goes on to quote the Commandments which the youth assures Jesus he has kept all his life. The Gospel says, "Jesus, looking at him, loved him" (Mk 10:21a).



This is how Jesus looks into our hearts when we feel so self-assured, but do not realize that we lack many things in our spiritual life. Jesus knowsContinued on page 3

The Joy of Discipleship

A member of ME42, a couple from ME44, the class of ME45, and five other BLD couples - what do they have in common? For the past seven months this group had been coming together in a didactic and spiritual journey to discipleship in Christ. As it concluded with its last plenary session on Saturday, September 29, one couldn't help but notice the smiles painted on their faces, and etched on the hearts of everyone.



The joy of discipleship - where does it come from? Perhaps it's from believing in what lies ahead. Or perhaps it is in discipleship itself, for as Pope Francis has said, joy is one of the defining characteristics of one who has truly encountered Jesus. In The Joy of Discipleship he exhorted, "Dear friends, be glad! Do not be afraid of being joyful!" In 1 Thessalonians, St. Paul describes disciples as his source of joy. "For what is our hope or joy or crown to boast of in the presence of our Lord Jesus at his coming if not you yourselves? For you are our glory and joy." (1 Thes 2:19-20)

I can only imagine the many different ways that this joy can be expressed, and the myriad channels it springs from. As I reminisce about the seven months of Discipling 2018, and as I now eagerly await the Aspirants' Retreat a few weeks from now, I see a parallel between my anticipation of the group becoming Covenanted Disciples and an expectant mother about to deliver her baby. She does what she has to do, with courage and determination. And then, the moment comes - she hears a cry, new life emerges, and she feels overwhelming joy as her baby is born!

The spiritual journey of discipleship can somehow be likened to that childbirth experience - filled with anticipation, uncertainty, some pains and struggles. Fully engaged in the discipling journey, we've felt joy, because we believe that a divine gift awaits us.

"Amen, amen, I say to you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. What is born of flesh is flesh and what is born of spirit is spirit. Do not be amazed that I told you, 'You must be born from above." (Jn 3:5-7)

Through their spiritual birth, disciples emerge, and we rejoice at that triumph.

that this young man is a good person, but He also sees his weak point and gives him a truthful exhortation, to give everything that he has to the poor and follow Him (cf Mk 10:21b). But apparently, this young man had a heart divided between two masters – God and money, and he goes away sad. He is too attached to his wealth to turn his back on it and follow Jesus instead.

When we are called to serve Jesus as He wants us to, are we like the young man in this episode? Sometimes or oftentimes, we might be materialistic like the rich young man. Knowingly or unknowingly, we have our attachments; there may be times when the thought of being without our cell phones, cars, and other prized possessions, including our careers, our comforts, and even our relationships, is inconceivable. The thought of giving up our vices and pleasures seems hard for us; so too is denying ourselves and putting God before all material things.

It is not bad to have money and other material goods, or to spend time on our temporal concerns, but if these things become our attachments and top priorities, then

this is not good for us. Instead, Jesus is asking us to share our blessings — time, talent and treasures, with those in need in order to inherit the Kingdom of God. Our theme reminds us of this: We inherit the Kingdom of God when we share our blessings with those in need. Our Lord Jesus



wants us to spend time serving Him every day, as well as to seek Him in prayer and in Scripture. He wants us to share our gifts and to serve our communities. Likewise, God expects us to be generous even if our financial resources are not plenty. Consistent financial giving is the best remedy for any greedy tendencies.

Jesus makes this solemn declaration: "I assure you that he who leaves everything to follow me will have eternal life in the age to come and a hundred times more now in this present age" (cf Mk 10:29-30). Pope Francis echoes these words today: "We deprive ourselves of goods and receive in exchange the joy of the true good; we free ourselves from slavery to things, and we win the liberty of service out of love; we renounce possessing and we attain the happiness of giving." About which Jesus said – "There is more joy in giving than receiving" (cf Acts 20:35).Continued on page 4

The rich young man did not allow himself to be conquered by the loving gaze of Jesus and so, he was not able to change. In fact, "he went away sad."

In one of his Angelus addresses, Pope Francis tells us: "Only in welcoming with humble gratitude the Lord's love do we free ourselves from the seduction of idols and the blindness of our illusions. Money, pleasure and success dazzle, but later they disappoint: they promise life but cause death. The Lord asks of us a detachment from these false riches to enter into true life, a full life that is authentic and luminous."

The Lord is inviting us to be poor, to live with and serve the poor; then the treasure of Heaven will be ours. In His promise, He says: "give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven." (Mk 10:21b). Unlike the rich young man, we can be with Jesus and be His true followers by being mindful of sharing our blessings and our gifts with those who are in need. Then we can rejoice in anticipation of our true treasure of eternal life in heaven.
